Rebecca Turner is Vermont's Chief Appellate Defender and has litigated several significant Vermont Supreme Court cases involving First Amendment defenses to threat, false information, and disorderly conduct offenses.

Marshall Pahl is Vermont's Chief Juvenile Defender.

Many of the most common charges in juvenile court include a significant speech component – like criminal threatening, false information to law enforcement, disorderly conduct, sexting, and dissemination of indecent material. Even while courts around the country have woken up to the science behind the diminished culpability of juveniles and young adults in the context of sentencing and jurisdiction, most still treat kids just like adults when it comes to the intent element of criminal offenses.
